## **Pearl Street CDC Highlights Program Achievements**

The Planning and Economic **Development Committee** met on November 30, 2016, for an update and presentation of the Pearl Street **Community Development** Corporation, Inc.'s (CDC) programs: Clothing Closet, **Evening Stars, Food Pantry/** Food Distribution, Housing, Sew Every Wednesday/ **Quilting Program, Summer** Feeding Program, community outreach activity and future goals and objectives. Each of the six (6) programs and their respective accomplishments were discussed; however, the housing update and development of the hotel property garnered the most attention, comments and thought provoking questions. **Pearl Street CDC is on track** 

to secure a developer for the CDC's vision of a senior living facility. The key highlight is, as of the end of November, the CDC is in discussion with a developer who is interested in the CDC's vision

of a senior living facility featuring a telemedicine health and wellness research component for seniors. The impact of improved healthcare and housing is our goal. Pearl Street CDC's vision is a 14 acre facility with 90-100 senior apartments, up to 10 units designated for individuals with disabilities, five to six independent garden homes, a medical suite, a therapy suite, exercise and activity area, multipurpose room, dining, restaurants, barber and beauty shops, a walking trail, and office, event and retail space. Please note that the vision listed is not all inclusive of each amenity that will be offered.

Another positive highlight, which supports the need for senior housing, is that the CDC has received community response to start a waiting list for future occupancy.

We look forward to sharing continued updates about the project.

# Food and Clothing to Assist Families

**CDC Food Pantry** 

The Pearl Street CDC provides food and clothing to community members who are in need of food or clothing based on income or other circumstances. Food is distributed by the CDC the first Thursday of each month to those families who qualify. The monthly donations help over 100 families receive food each month, with over 1200 families being served in 2016. Each box of food is valued over 60 dollars.

#### **CDC Clothing Closet**

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The Clothing Pantry provides clothes to children and families who are in dire need of clothes.

Families who have lost everything because of a fire, a natural disaster or other circumstances may call the CDC for assistance. The Pearl Street CDC strives to meet the needs of all who are seeking help through our food pantry and clothing closet. The food pantry and clothing closet both operate on donations and financial contributions. Some repeat donors include the Laura Felts Women's Missionary Society, and members of Pearl St. AME Church. Because our food assistance is ongoing, we are currently accepting donations. We assist families that request emergency assistance, as well as those referred by other organizations.

Families who find themselves in emergency situations and need food may contact the CDC for help.
